- 1. Students will develop an understanding of how the convergence of people from Africa, Asia, and Europe have impacted the culture of America.
- 2. Students will understand the reasons for European colonization and how the original 13 English colonies took hold in the United States.
- 3. Students will understand how the original 13 English colonies developed economically, socially and politically.
- 4. Students will develop an understanding of the causes and effects of the American Revolution.
- 5. Students will understand the important roles played by African Americans, women, and Native Americans in the Revolution.
- 6. Students will know the challenges the new American republic faced following the Revolution and how the United Sates Constitution reflected those challenges.
- Students will identify the domestic and foreign problems America faced following the American Revolution during the late 18<sup>th</sup> and early 19<sup>th</sup> centuries.
- 8. Students will understand how regional differences fueled the debate over states' rights versus federal power.
- 9. Students will understand the causes and effects of the various reform movements that swept the nation during the first half of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century (Great Awakening, Enlightenment)
- 10. Students will understand the causes and consequences of westward expansion (post-Mexican War)
- 11. Students will understand the causes, outcomes, and legacy of the American Civil War.
- 12. Students will understand the political struggles, accomplishments, and failures of Reconstruction in the years following the Civil War.
- 13. Students will understand how westward migration after the Civil War impacted the United States (Transportation, Native American Relations)
- 14. Students will understand how scientific discoveries in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century improved manufacturing and efficiency in the workplace. (Carnegie, Rockefeller, Ford)
- 15. Students will understand who the "New Immigrants" were and how their arrival influenced politics, economics, and society in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century.
- Students will understand the importance of the Progressive Movement in bringing about social change in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. (Teddy Roosevelt/Woodrow Wilson Years)
- 17. Students will understand how World War I affected the United States and Europe.
- 18. Students will understand the origins of the political and social changes that took place in America during 1920's.
- 19. Students will develop an understanding of how the consumer practices of the 1920's were instrumental in causing the Great Depression.
- 20. Students will understand the long-lasting consequences of the Great Depression on the people who lived through it.
- 21. Students will understand how the New Deal forever changed the influence of the government on everyday life in America.

- 22. Students will understand how the tough economic times of the 1930's led to the rise of dictatorships in in Germany, Italy, and Russia.
- 23. Students will understand how the United States used it's resources to swing the tide of WWII in favor of the Allies.
- 24. Students will understand how post-WWII tensions resulted in the Cold War from the 1940's through the 1990's.
- 25. Students will understand the economics, social, and political changes that occurred during the 1950's and 1960's.
- 26. Students will understand the achievements and challenges of the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations.
- 27. Students will understand how African Americans fought discrimination in the 1950's and 1960's.
- 28. Students will understand the military and political events of the Vietnam War and how the conflict impacted life in the United States for decades to come.
- 29. Students will develop an understanding of the social protests and calls for change that swept across the nation in the 1960's.
- 30. Students will understand the key political, social, and economic events of the 1970's and 1980's.
- 31. Students will develop an understanding of the most important issues that affect the United States in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.
